

A VISITOR'S GUIDE TO TOWSON AND BALTIMORE





TOWSON

Towson is a suburb of Baltimore founded in 1768 as an affluent residential community for business owners and merchants working in the city or participating in the port trade. Although an unincorporated municipality, Towson has served as the county seat since 1854 and continues to be the center of local government and related professional, educational and financial services. Over time, Towson has maintained its residential base and added office, retail and recreational components making it a self-contained town and a vibrant thriving regional center.

Facts Towson is the largest unincorporated county seat in the continental United States.

The corporate headquarters for the world's foremost toolmaker, Black & Decker, is located in Towson.

A recent national survey listed the Towson Public Library as the busiest suburban library in the U.S.

York Road, which is the main artery running through the heart of our community, was originally a horse and wagon toll road stretching from York, Pennsylvania to the Baltimore Harbor.

Calvert Hall College High School, located in Towson and founded in 1845 is the oldest Christian Brothers school in the United States.

The 287 acre campus of Goucher College and the 242 acre campus of Towson University are both located in Towson less than a mile apart.

The Carmelite Monastery in Towson, home to a Catholic order of nuns, is the oldest Carmelite community in the United States.

TOWSON UNIVERSITY

With a total enrollment of 19,758, Towson University is the largest comprehensive university in the Baltimore area. Towson University is nationally recognized for its excellent programs in the arts and sciences, communications, business, health professions, education, fine arts, and computer information systems.

Facts TU has 20 Division I athletic teams (13 in women's sports, 7 in men's sports);

U.S. News & World Report ranked Towson University fifth in the Public Universities-Master's (North) category for its 2006 America's Best Colleges issue;

TU 's campus has become a major regional conference destination, playing host each year to approximately 800,000 visitors and 10,000 meetings, conferences and special events;

TU has had five Fulbright scholars: one each to Spain, France, Belize, Japan, and Iceland;

TU's gerontology program is one of only 100 undergraduate programs offered in the United States;

TU is Maryland's largest producer of teachers; and,

TU 's WTMD Radio (89.7) boasts one of the largest listening audiences of any public radio station in Maryland.

BALTIMORE



The city is named after the founding proprietor of the Maryland Colony, Lord Baltimore in the Irish House of Lords. Baltimore himself took his title from Baltimore in County Longford in Ireland, which is the English transliteration of the Irish language Baile an Tí Mór, or "Townland of the big house". Baltimore became the second leading port of entry for immigrants to the United States during the 1800s.

Baltimore's nickname is Charm City because of the great people who live here. The best way to experience it is by exploring the folksy neighborhoods. From light rail to water taxis, there are plenty of options for getting around. While temperatures are rarely extreme, it's wise to check the weather before stepping out. No matter the season, there is always something to do here, hon. From the thrills of the Preakness Stakes to the creative charm of Artscape, Bawlmer is extraordinary.

Baltimore is among the more enjoyable stops on the east coast, and its closely knit neighborhoods and historic quarters provide an engaging backdrop to many diverse attractions, especially those along its celebrated waterfront, like the Inner Harbor's National Aquarium, the Pier 6 Concert Pavilion, and the Power Plant entertainment complex. The city also boasts top-rated museums, like the Walters Art Museum and the child-oriented, interactive Port Discovery, which covers everything from fine arts through black history to urban archeology.

MOVIES FILMED IN & AROUND BALTIMORE

Absolute Power (1997) Clint Eastwood discovers presidential corruption during his final heist before being arrested, but not before he and Gene Hackman appear in several sites around Baltimore. The Towson Court House doubles as the site of a presidential press conference, Brooklandville's Maryland Prep is the mansion, and Eastwood shows the thief's artsy side while sketching at the Walters' Art Gallery. Northeast Baltimore homes constitute most of the scenes set in D.C. and the cliff scenes were filmed at Elk Neck State Park in Cecil County.

Along Came a Spider (2001) Starring Morgan Freeman, Monica Potter, and Penelope Ann Miller, large chunks of the movie were filmed in Baltimore.

Avalon (1990) Starring Armin Mueller-Stahl, Joan Plowright, Elizabeth Perkins, Aidan Quinn, and Kevin Pollak, Avalon chronicles the story of a Jewish family in Baltimore in 1914. Includes shots of East Mount Vernon Place, Baltimore City Court House, the Broadway Pier in Fells Point, Wilkins Avenue, the Key Monument at Eutaw Place, St. Mary's Seminary on Northern Parkway, Hollins Market, The Senator Theatre, Green Spring Inn, and Lutherville.

Beloved (1998) Starring Oprah Winfrey, Danny Glover, and Thandie Newton, Beloved is based on Toni Morrison's award winning novel about a former slave's struggle with the ghosts of her past. Some Ohio homestead scenes were filmed at Fair Hill Natural Resources Area in Cecil County.

Blair Witch Project (1999) Filmed entirely in Burkittsville in Frederick County; Seneca Creek State Park in Montgomery County; and Patapsco Valley State Park along the border of Howard County and Carroll County. The shack at the end of the film was one director Eduardo Sanchez remembered from growing up in the area.

Cry Baby (1990) Johnny Depp, Ricki Lake, and Iggy Pop star in a musical directed by Baltimore filmmaker extraordinaire, John Waters. Filmed in Baltimore and at the old Franklin High School in Reisterstown, the Maryland Training School for Boys and the Enchanted Forest in Howard County. Directed by John Waters. Starring Johnny Depp, Amy Locane, Susan Tyrrell, Polly Bergen, and Ricki Lake.

Die Hard: With a Vengeance (1995) Although set in New York and Canada, it was filmed in Baltimore and Jessup County. This movie stars Bruce Willis, Jeremy Irons, and Samuel L. Jackson.

Enemy of the State (1998) Starring Will Smith, Gene Hackman, Jon Voight, and Lisa Bonet, the film pits Will Smith against the D.C. intelligentsia. Set in D.C., but actually filmed in Baltimore.

Hairspray (1988) A fat teen teaches Baltimore a lesson about integration. Starring Sonny Bono, Ruth Brown, Divine, Debbie Harry and Ricki Lake.

He Said, She Said (1991) A pair of Baltimore Sun journalists duke it out about the different ways men and women see the world. Filmed at the SunPapers Building, Baltimore City Hall, and Bolton Hill, the film stars Kevin Bacon, Elizabeth Perkins, Nathan Lane and Sharon Stone.

Ladder 49 (2003) Look for scenes filmed in Baltimore including the 2003 St. Patrick's Day Parade and the Shamrock 5K Race. Other scenes were filmed around Curtis Bay just south of the Inner Harbor. This film stars Joaquin Phoenix, John Travolta, Al Pacino, and Michelle Pfeiffer.

Pelican Brief (1993) Julia Roberts stars as a law student whose brief about the assassination of two Supreme Court justices makes it into the wrong hands. Some scenes filmed in Montgomery County. Other stars include Denzel Washington, Sam Shepard, and John Heard.

Pink Flamingos (1972) This indie classic directed and written by John Waters about a Baltimore family's fight to retain title of "Filthiest Family Alive", stars include Divine, David Lochary, Mary Vivian Pearce, and Mink Stole.

Red Dragon (2002) Dr. Hannibal Lecter resides at a Baltimore Psychiatric Hospital in this prequel to "The Silence of the Lambs." Some scenes were filmed in Baltimore. The Baltimore Sun building, for instance, stands in for the tabloid at which Philip Seymour Hoffman's sleazy reporter works.

The Replacements (2000) Starring Keanu Reeves, Gene Hackman, and Brooke Langton, the movie tells the story of trying to scrape together a scab football team during the 1987 football strike. Almost all of the football scenes were filmed at Ravens Stadium in Baltimore, sometimes during actual Ravens games. A few scenes were filmed at Redskins Stadium in Landover, Prince George's County.

The Runaway Bride (1999) Julia Roberts and Richard Gere reunite in a movie about a woman who leaves her fiancé at the altar. The movie is set in a fictional Maryland town, Hale, but was filmed in real Maryland towns including Berlin and Snow Hill in Worcester County, New Windsor in Carroll County and Baltimore City. Most shots intended as New York City were actually shot in Baltimore, as well.

Satisfaction (1988) Starring Justine Bateman, Liam Nelson, and Julia Roberts, this movie relives the 1980s band scene with Mystery, four girls and a guy, who play a bar on the coast for the summer. Portions of the film shot in Baltimore.

Serial Mom (1994) This black comedy about a suburban housewife turned serial killer was filmed in and around Baltimore. The film stars Kathleen Turner, Sam Waterston, Ricki Lake, and Matthew Lillard.

Shooter (2007) Scenes from the Mark Wahlberg thriller were shot in Federal Hill in October 2006.

Sleepless in Seattle (1993) A Baltimore Sun journalist falls for a widowed Seattle man via his son's call to a radio talk show. Starring Tom Hanks and Meg Ryan, this was filmed in Annapolis, Fells Point, Mount Vernon, the Sunpapers Building, Women's Industrial Exchange, and the Peabody Library.

Sum of All Fears (2002) Filmed in Baltimore, around Maryland and Washington, D.C., the world is pushed toward an impending war when a bomb detonates outside Baltimore during the Super Bowl. This film stars Ben Affleck, Morgan Freeman, and Liev Schreiber.

Syriana (2005) Starring George Clooney in a story of the post-Cold War CIA's involvement in the Middle East, filming locations included the Avenue at White Marsh, downtown Baltimore, a mansion in Guilford, and a yacht in the Inner Harbor. Other stars include Amanda Peet and Matt Damon.

There's Something About Mary (1998) Cameron Diaz, Ben Stiller, and Matt Dillon star in this comedy classic that was partially filmed in Baltimore.

Tin Men (1987) Baltimore filmmaker Barry Levinson did. His childhood home is the house that gets sided and other Baltimore landmarks like the John Eager Howard Room at the Belvedere Hotel, Mount Vernon, Memorial Stadium, Enoch Pratt Free Library and Pimlico Road appear. Starring Richard Dreyfuss, Danny DeVito, and Barbara Hershey.

True Lies (1994) He can tango. He can two-step. He can lead two lives. Wow. Schwarzenegger is a brilliant actor, sort of. At work, he's a tough-edged government agent on the tail of a terrorist. At home, he pretends to be a computer salesman. The two finally have to mesh because he must seduce his bored wife. Filmed in Bethesda, Montgomery County, this film stars Arnold Schwarzenegger, Jamie Lee Curtis, and Tom Arnold.

Tuck Everlasting (2002) After a teenager finds a strange family living on her parent's property she learns that they have discovered a spring that holds the key to immortality. The movie was filmed in Baltimore, Bel Air, and Berlin and stars William Hurt, Ben Kingsley, and Sissy Spacek.

Twelve Monkeys (1995) Bruce Willis is sent back in time to find the source of a monster epidemic that left only one percent of the population alive by 2035, but faces obstacles when he goes back to the wrong year. Most of the movie was filmed in the Mount Vernon area. The engineer's club on Mount Vernon Place is the location for a banquet. Other stars include Brad Pitt and Madeleine Stowe.

xXx: State of the Union (2005) Starring Ice Cube, Willem Dafoe, Xzibit and Samuel L. Jackson, various parts of this sequel were filmed in Baltimore.

INNER HARBOR

Distinct in function and form, Baltimoreans and visitors alike enjoy Baltimore's Inner Harbor and the surrounding neighborhoods that offer a variety of fine dining, cultural experiences and exciting nightlife. The Inner Harbor is a historic seaport, tourist attraction, and iconic landmark of the City of Baltimore, Maryland. The Inner Harbor itself is actually the end of the Northwest Branch of the Patapsco River and includes any water west of a line drawn between the National Aquarium in Baltimore and the Rusty Scupper restaurant. The term "Inner Harbor" is used not just for the water but for the surrounding area of the city, with approximate street boundaries of President Street, Lombard Street, Light Street, and Key Highway. It is within walking distance of Oriole Park at Camden Yards and M&T Bank Stadium and has a water taxi that connects the Inner Harbor to Fells Point, Canton, and Fort McHenry.

BALTIMORE WORLD TRADE CENTER

Located in the Inner Harbor, the Baltimore World Trade Center is the world's tallest equilateral five-sided building (the five-sided JPMorgan Chase Tower in Houston, Texas is taller, but has unequal sides). Its observation deck, called "Top of the World," is open to the public during daytime hours. You can see the entire Baltimore Inner Harbor "at your feet" below, historic Federal Hill Park to the south and the World Port of Baltimore's "outer harbor" to the southeast. The landmark tower also houses the headquarters of the Maryland Port Administration as well as hosting office space to numerous companies and several state agencies.

THE NATIONAL AQUARIUM IN BALTIMORE

Opened in 1981, the National Aquarium in Baltimore is world-famous and undoubtedly Maryland's leading tourist attraction. Whether you're an educator, a student or simply a visitor wanting to glance at the magnificent exhibits, the National Aquarium in Baltimore in Inner Harbor has a lot to offer.

Housing more than 11,000 creatures, the National Aquarium in Baltimore exhibits a variety of species in their naturalistic habitats. You'll find animals such as stingrays, sharks, sea turtles, bullfrogs, phytoplankton, monkeys, sloths, iguanas, and puffins. The list is perpetual so you have to check the exhibits out for yourself. You can also catch an up-close view of dolphins as they leap and tumble with the National Aquarium in Baltimore trainers in the live-action Dolphin Show.

MARYLAND SCIENCE CENTER

Serving more than half a million visitors per year, the Maryland Science Center has been one of the Inner Harbor's main attractions since 1976. Entertaining and educational to the young and old alike, it is undoubtedly one of the city's most exciting places to visit. With hands-on exhibits and spectacular displays in the wonderful world of science and technology, the Maryland Science Center is a great way to gain hands on experience and first-hand knowledge.

At the Maryland Science Center you'll find three floors of demonstrations to exercise your imagination and challenge your mind. See exciting combustible reactions, eye-boggling optical illusions and find out about lasers. Hands-on exhibits include a voyage through the human body and learning about how microbes work for us. With a larger than life, five-story 3D IMAX Movie Theater, complete with surround sound and stadium seating, the objects seem to leap off the screen, looking real enough to touch and making you feel like you're IN the movie. The Davis Planetarium features programs to explore the sky and discover space exploration at its finest.

BALTIMORE ORIOLES

The Orioles, more affectionately known as 'the Birds' or 'the O's' to the city's serious fans, are Baltimore's MLB team, playing in the Eastern Division of the American League. The Baltimore Orioles play ball in Oriole Park at Camden Yards, a natural grass ball park finished in 1992 and named for the original Oriole Park lost to fire back in the 1940's.

The city of Baltimore has a rich baseball history and has been home to one baseball team or another for over 125 years. The first record of baseball in Baltimore is in 1882, when Harry Vonderhorst sponsored a Baltimore team in the American Association of baseball clubs. In 1894, the Baltimore Orioles won their first professional baseball championship and in 1903 the team moved to New York and eventually became today's New York Yankees.

In September of 1953, the St. Louis Browns moved to Baltimore after several dismal seasons and a drop in game attendance. Renamed the Baltimore Orioles, after the black and orange state bird of Maryland, the team didn't perform much better but the O's definitely attracted Baltimore baseball fans.

Things began looking up for the Birds in the late 50's and by 1961 fans were rewarded with seeing Jim Gentile set 11 team records and their Baltimore Orioles finish the season 95-67-1.

Just four years later Frank Robinson joined the Orioles and in 1966 they won their first World Series, defeating the Los Angeles Dodgers in a 4-game sweep. Bitter defeat came in 1969 when the favored Oriole shockingly lost the World Series to the Mets.

Babe Ruth Baltimore's Sultan of Swing, George Herman Ruth, Jr. was born in Baltimore. Growing up in adversity, playing baseball in school at St. Mary's led him on his path to becoming a great American hero. He was recruited by Jack Dunn, the Baltimore Orioles (then a minor league Red Sox team) owner and manager, when he was just 19 years old. When folks began referring to him as "Jack's newest Babe" the nickname stuck. Babe Ruth played with the Baltimore Orioles for just five short months before the Major League Boston Red Sox purchased his contract.

Cal Ripken His jersey, the one worn in his final game, is already in the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, NY there and so is the lineup card from his 2,130th consecutive game. That game tied Lou Gehrig's previous record for the most consecutive games played. Nicknamed "Iron Man," Calvin Edward Ripken, Jr. went on to play in

2,632 straight games in Major League Baseball. Born in Havre de Grace, Maryland, he spent his entire career with the Baltimore Orioles.

BALTIMORE RAVENS

The Ravens, Baltimore's NFL football team, are in the North Division of the AFC. The Baltimore Ravens play in the state-of-the-art M&T Bank Stadium located at the south point of Camden Yards. Easily accessible from Route 95, it has a splendid view of the Baltimore skyline, sports the latest in video big screens in each end zone and is within walking distance of the Inner Harbor.

In 1996, when Art Modell moved the Browns from Cleveland to Baltimore, the city embraced NFL football once again and the Baltimore Ravens were born. Although the Browns' name remained in Cleveland, the players moved to Baltimore to become the Baltimore Ravens as an unusual expansion team. Bringing pro football back to Baltimore in 1996, after a 13-year void, the exciting style of the Baltimore Ravens has invigorated the city and captivated football fans in Baltimore and the surrounding region. In 2001, the Baltimore Ravens defeated the New York Giants, 34-7 to win Super Bowl XXXV, with Baltimore's Ray Lewis named the Super Bowl MVP.

Baltimore's first pro football team was the Baltimore Colts. The name was chosen as a result of a fan contest. Honoring the tradition of horse racing and breeding in Baltimore's horse country, the name became so connected to the city that fans were upset when the Irsay family would not relinquish the name to Baltimore. The Baltimore Colts moved to become the Indianapolis Colts.

The blue and white Baltimore Colts played at Memorial Stadium from 1953 to 1983, with famous coaches like Don Shula from 1963 to 1969, two time winner of the Coach of the Year award, and Ted Marchibroda from 1975 to 1979, Coach of the Year Award in 1975. Arguably one of the most famous quarterbacks in the history of football, Johnny Unitas, played for the Baltimore Colts from 1956 to 1972. Other hall-of-famers from the Baltimore Colts include Raymond Berry, Artie Donovan, Ted Hendricks, John Mackey, Gino Marchetti, Lenny Moore, Jim Parker and Joe Perry. Weeb Ewbank and Don Shula are also inductees into the National Football Hall of Fame.

The Baltimore Colts made two super bowl appearances. They lost Super Bowl III in 1968 to the New York Jets but won Super Bowl V against the Dallas Cowboys in 1970. The Colts played their last game in Baltimore on December 18, 1983.

FORT MCHENRY

Located off I-95, just southeast of Baltimore's Inner Harbor, the star-shaped Fort McHenry was designed by a Frenchman named Jean Foncin and named after James McHenry who served as Secretary of War from 1796 to 1800 and supported construction of the new fort. A famous point of interest best known for its role in the Battle of Baltimore, Fort McHenry successfully staved off the British invasion of Baltimore by sea while the Battle of North Point was fought on land.

During the War of 1812, the brick fort defended the Baltimore harbor and stopped a British advance into the city. Surrounded by water on three sides and far enough from Baltimore to provide protection without endangering the city, it was the valiant defense of the fort by 1,000 Americans that inspired Francis Scott Key, a lawyer and amateur poet, to compose the *Star Spangled Banner*, originally entitled *Defense of Fort McHenry*.

Administered by the National Park Service in 1933, Fort McHenry is the only area of the National Park System to be designated both a National Monument and Historic Shrine. It is a tradition that when a new flag is designed for use by the United States, it is first flown over Fort McHenry, over the same ramparts referred to in the National Anthem. The first official flags with 49 stars, and with 50 stars, were flown over Fort McHenry, and remain there today.

BALTIMORE MUSEUMS

If you are a visual person, be sure to make a pit stop at the Baltimore Museum of Art (Maryland's largest art museum), the American Visionary Art Museum (which displays original works of art created by self-taught artists), or the Walters Art Museum (which proudly boasts 55 centuries of art from around the world). America's first wax museum featuring Black history and culture, the Great Blacks in Wax Museum features over 100 life-size wax figures. A former Underground Railroad stop, the Baltimore Civil War Museum is also a notable place of interest. Other museums of interest include Mt. Washington's Baltimore Clayworks, Port Discovery, the National Museum of Dentistry, and the Fire Museum of Maryland.

DINING OUT

What makes Baltimore restaurant dining so enticing is the variety it has to offer. Baltimore's mix of regional culture and ethnic cuisines is spread out among the many different neighborhoods in the area. Once you've enjoyed the native seafood you find in Fells Point and the Inner Harbor, you might savor authentic Mexican cuisine in Federal Hill, make a stop in Mt. Vernon to tingle your taste buds with an Indian or Afghan meal, treat yourself to a Greek feast in Canton or satisfy your stomach with some good old American dishes in Hampden. Little Italy is the place to go for homemade pasta and Italian pizzerias.
